† Affirmation of Faith From A Brief Statement of Faith Rev. Cornell We trust in God the Holy Spirit everywhere the giver and renewer of life. The Spirit justifies us by grace through faith, sets us free to accept ourselves and to love God and neighbor, and binds us together with all believers in the one body of Christ, the Church. The same Spirit who inspired the prophets and apostles rules our faith and life in Christ through Scripture, engages us through the Word proclaimed, claims us in the waters of baptism, feeds us with the bread of life and the cup of salvation, and calls women and men to all ministries of the Church. In a broken and fearful world the Spirit gives us courage to pray without ceasing, to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in Church and culture, to hear the voices of peoples long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace. In gratitude to God, empowered by the Spirit, we strive to serve Christ in our daily tasks and to live holy and joyful lives, even as we watch for God's new heaven and new earth, praying, "Come, Lord Jesus!"

"Christian tradition has regarded [the Lord's Prayer] as a prayer that sums up all our petitions, appropriate for all occasions. From the time of the Didache (late first or early second century), the Lord's Prayer has held a privileged place among Christian prayers. As adult candidates were prepared for baptism, the Lord's Prayer was "handed over" and expounded to them along with the creed as an integral part of their catechesis... The sixteenth-century reformers, with their emphasis on edification, retained this expectation and used the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments as the basis for their catechisms."
