Mount Vernon Presbyterian Revives Stephen Ministry - Pat Bartee, Leader

Mission Statement
The Stephen Ministry Team will be the AFTER
people, expanding care beyond the challenging
event and having a person to journey with you and
share the burden as you come back to wholeness.

Twenty years ago Mount Vernon Presbyterian had a Stephen Ministry. I volunteered to restart the program and attended Leadership Training in January 2019 to become a Stephen Leader for the Stephen Ministry, a one on one, confidential, distinctively Christian care ministry of trained and skilled lay people.

What an exhaustive and intensive training week it was, some days beginning at 8:30 a.m. and ending at 9:30 p.m. in a room with 329 other lay people from 35 states and 4 countries! I sat at a table all week with 3 Catholics, 2 Lutherans, 2 Methodists and we were absolutely on the same page about congregational care. Some of us were starting a new ministry and others were Stephen Ministers stepping into Stephen Leader roles. What a beautiful Ecumenical relationship grew between us!

I am grateful to Lutheran pastor, Dr. Kenneth Haugk, also trained as a psychologist who, many years ago, felt laypeople could be trained to assist the pastoral staff and spread the love and comfort of Christ in larger and wider circles. Other churches wanted such a program and Stephen Ministry was formed and its' licensed training program has reached over 13,500 congregations in multiple countries.

Mount Vernon's new ministry was advertised in January and interviews of interested potential ministers are taking place through Feb. 21. Training will begin in late Feb. and last several months. During the early summer we hope to commission a new team.

So what will these ministers do for the congregation and how will they fit into the pastoral care and congregational ministries already existing?

This team will be the AFTER people, the ones who come to be with you in a totally confidential relationship and to walk with you AFTER a challenging or difficult time. They are trained listeners, not counselors or advisers, and when you ask for them; they will be there for you until you find resolution and wholeness.

Our pastors cannot do it all and Christ commanded all of us as laypeople to love one another. Stephen in one of the first Christian churches made congregational care his mission and Stephen ministers are named from his service. Stephen Ministry will DEPEND on our congregation to be our eyes and ears and to refer our hurting and lonely to the new ministry.

PW 101.10: Who is gathering this year? Presbyterian Women is connectional, and that means we gather! We gather monthly (more or less) in our congregational circles for Bible study and mission. PW in the Presbytery gatherings tend to take place semiannually, in the spring and fall of each year. This year, the year after the Churchwide Gathering, all PW in the Synod groups are meeting. Depending on which synod we are in, we may gather as a synod PW annually, semiannually or triennially, usually in the summer. Our national gathering—the Churchwide Gathering—occurs once every three years, usually during the summer. Whenever and wherever PW gathers, our gatherings strengthen community and affirm our connectional nature.

Discerning Forgiveness

May 12 - 15, 2019

Description: The Christian faith is indelibly and distinctively marked by the imperative both to receive and to offer forgiveness. But Christian voices on the subject differ widely. Some urge forgiveness as a Christian duty under all circumstances, while others argue that certain prior conditions must be met for forgiveness to be meaningful or effective. Some believe forgiveness is the surest route to healing for the offended, while others hold that therapeutic value cannot be the essence of Christian forgiveness. How do we sort through the competing claims and varied interpretations? What is the core nature and role of this powerful divine gift we are called to participate in? Our class will help us attend to several voices in this debate, discern some of the complexities of timing and circumstance, claim a stance with scriptural and theological integrity, and engage in key practices to help us learn the "craft" of forgiveness.
