

#### Taize Returns

We are glad to announce that after a hiatus, we are bringing the Taize Prayer service back. This service will take place every fourth Wednesday at 8:15pm.

What is Taize? This is a service of songs, silence, and scripture. It began in 1940 amid the violence of World War II in France. In line with these beginnings, Taize prayer is intended to suspend time for the parishioner. The simplistic songs are meant to be a chant that become prayers, while the silence invites one to talk to God, or more importantly, for God to speak to you.

# OUTREACH



At the beginning of the New Year, we sorted your very generous donations to the Outreach Tree. The donations were divided up between many of our Outreach Ministry Partners. We were able to "Stuff the Bus" again for Stirred-Up Ministries with warm clothes, as well as many boxes of hand sanitizer and face masks. We also distributed items to the International Women's House, Clifton Night Shelter, Community Assistance Center and the VA Domiciliary, a residential level of treatment for homeless Veterans. The Domiciliary will be a new Outreach Ministry Partner for us. It was brought to our attention by Shari Freeman after she did a summer seminary internship at the VA Hospital.

The January Communion Offering was non-perishable food for the Food Pantries of the Community Assistance Center.

The February Communion Offering will be cereal, snacks, coffee, sugar, new twin sheets, new men's socks, and new Men's Underwear (size M and L) for Clifton Homeless Shelter.





A Letter from Pastor Jane at the Garden Hills Presbyterian Church in Zambia, thanking us for sending Outreach funds for them to buy more chickens:

I trust you are well. Here in Zambia we are in good shape. What we have done is to increase the number of chicks from 100 to 250. So these are in two deliveries, after two weeks we are getting another 125 so that there will be no gap in the sales.

So far things seem to be going well despite the heavy rains that are being experienced in the country. We want to take advantage of the rains and the chicken droppings and also invest in vegetable gardening. We have so far employed one person to watch over the chicken run. Will keep on updating you. ## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT



#### Volunteer Spotlight: Sam McClurg

Sam has been involved with Los Niños Primero for many years, serving as Chairman of the Board, bus driver, First Aid provider for skinned knees and boo-boos on little heads – anything that is needed, Sam jumps in. Anyone who knows Sam, knows his love and commitment to LNP. Below, Sam answers the question: Why do I serve?

Los Niños Primero was founded at Mount Vernon Presbyterian Church in 2001 to foster the academic skills of Latino children in Sandy Springs to enable them to perform at the level of other youngsters in early elementary school. The first person to be hired to start this new program was Maritza Morelli, who is now the Executive Director of LNP, but was then an employee of the Fulton

County Schools and functioned as the liaison between the Latin community in North Fulton County. It was agreed from the outset that LNP must offer quality programs, but it must be a joy to be a participant, or the children would not want to attend.

An example of how children feel about Los Niños Primero is the boy who attended the LNP program for two years before he was enrolled at Lake Forest Elementary for kindergarten. He told his mother after the first few days that he wanted to go to the Los Niños Primero school instead of Lake Forest because it was a lot more fun.

Academically LNP's success is demonstrated by comparing how Los Niños children perform compared to those who have not had the opportunity to attend its programs. Also, all children who attend the summer program are tested before the program starts and at its conclusion every year. The progress the children make in five weeks is remarkable. All the faculty in the program are certified with the required educational training. Many of the LNP teachers return either for the summer program or Saturday school, or both and therefore give up five weeks of their summer break or two Saturdays a month. The joy the teachers receive from being able to practice their professions as they have been trained, is demonstrated by their willingness to return Saturday after Saturday or summer after summer.

It is not just the excellent teachers who make the programs successful. Each classroom has two or three teen volunteers who are there to assist the teacher. They may help children one-on-one, take a child to the restroom, provide comfort when first aid is required for a scrape or bruise, or assist in providing snacks and lunches. Like the teacher, the teen volunteers experience joy from LNP that causes them to return like the teachers do. A number of volunteers have decided to major in Early Childhood Education in college and have returned to teach at LNP upon graduation and certification.

The success of Los Niños Primero has been not just the quality of its academic programs, but the joy it brings to its participants: The children, the teachers, the teen volunteers, the parents, as well as the adults who volunteer to serve the organization. If you would like to participate in the joy that LNP brings to its participants, there are positions on committees that deal with fund raising, budgeting and financial management, human resources, recruitment, and the teen volunteers. 

#### Stated Session Meeting & Retreat January 20 & 21, 2023

Following is a summary of the meeting:

• New Elders were examined to prepare for their ordination and installation on January 22. • The Fellowship Ministry Team has all of its 2023 events scheduled and on the church calendar. Upcoming is a Mystery Dinner planned for Sunday evening, February 5.

• February 26 was approved as the date for the MVPC Annual Meeting which will take place following the church service. A lunch will be part of that meeting.

• The annual statistical report for PC(USA) was approved; the Clerk will pass along to PC(USA) various statistics about MVPC.

 Recently a committee led by Steve Ray and composed of Elizabeth Abernethy, Pat Davis, and David Hill made updates to the MVPC Personnel Handbook which has now been approved by the Session.  $\cdot$  The church budget for 2023 was approved.

• A slate of officers for the MVPC Corporation was approved to present to the congregation for approval at the Annual Meeting. The slate includes John Hibbard, President; Charlie Gray, Vice President; Pat Davis, Secretary; and John Christian, Treasurer.


• Commissioners were elected to represent MVPC at the February Presbytery meeting.

• The pastoral staff has mapped out the worship schedule for the year which will include two outdoor services in the spring and another two in the fall. Since the HVAC system replacement will take place this summer, worship services will be held in Fellowship Hall. We will make accommodations for the Los Niños Primero and Family Promise programs; both programs use Fellowship Hall for portions of the summer.

The next Stated Session Meeting will be February 19.

Blessings for all ministries our church supports in Atlanta and in Zambia. Faith and fortitude for the freedom fighters of Ukraine.


