A Letter From The Pastor

Easter Care

You may recall that back in January during worship we had you take a survey that examined our congregational vitality. We held this "Survey Sunday" as we called it as part of the Vital Congregations Initiative (VCI) we have engaged in since January, 2022. A few weeks ago we got the results back, and while I don't want to exhaust you with the entirety of what it said, I do want to celebrate one thing we gleaned from it: you are a CARING church.

In the results, it quantified what an average congregation looks like utilizing the seven marks of a vital congregation. Furthermore, it said if your congregation shows a difference of 3 percentage points or more on any particular vital mark, then you should see that mark as unique to your church. One of those vital marks is Caring Relationships, and while the average congregation scored 84% on this particular mark, you at MVPC scored 87%. The United States Congregational Vitality Survey (USCVS)

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Session Summary

(the survey we took back in January) reveals that congregations that display Caring meetings usually only happen Relationships show that "instead of when we are welcoming a closed, judgmental community, people find freedom to share stories, encounter the Savior, and ask for help."

When I read that quote, I see a lot of what life looks like at MVPC. I see an open community that is constantly welcoming in new people each and every week. Recently, I sat down with an old pastor friend of mine and I asked him what percentage of worshippers at his church were visitors, because ours each week is the comfort of a pew or the 10-15%. He sat back and said, "Not that many." Now sure, some go on Whatever it is, may our CARING to join the church, some choose to ways inspire them, for then they remain a visitor but continue to attend, and some come once and we never see them again, but no matter what, our goal is to show them we CARE. I believe we do that. As David Hill, our Session Clerk, told me, we held a Called

Session meeting nearly once a month last year- and called someone new to the church. That means people are responding to your CARE.

Here in a few days we will celebrate Easter, a time when that visitor percentage will go through the roof. This, once again, will be an opportunity for us to CARE by welcoming our neighbors to encounter the Savior, and solicit help in their own way. Perhaps that help will be as simple as offering them sustenance of bread and cup. might just share their story with us, and when they do that, they might just breathe new life into our story.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT Carol Beckman

Often called "The Outreach Lady," Carol Beckman's heart and her hands have been deep into the work of Outreach at Mount Vernon for many years. In discussing her wide and varied work to help others, her story gives a vivid picture of how God has blessed MVPC and how we work to bless others.

As a long-time member of Mount Vernon (40 years this March), I continue to be inspired by the church's continuing commitment to Outreach and the many ways we show our love of God by loving our neighbors in our local community, the greater Atlanta area, and across the world in Africa.

The founding of the Community Assistance Center on our campus in the mid-1980's followed by the establishment of Los Niños Primero in the late 1990's were pivotal events for our congregation. Also, during this time frame, the congregation began a long and rewarding partnership with Atlanta Ministry with International Students and Christmas International House. In the late 1990's through the early mid-2000s, Mount Vernon families also served as host homes for children from around the world brought to Atlanta by ChildSpring International for medical treatment not available in their home countries (including Ethiopia, El Salvador, Haiti, Nicaragua, eastern Europe, and Colombia). Many of the congregation will remember Yessica Parra who, with her mother, stayed in my home four times over a period of 5 years while having surgery for life-threatening tumors. Not only did Yessica survive but scholarships provided by church members and other Atlanta friends allowed her to graduate from college with a degree in modern languages. I was thrilled to travel to Colombia along with the case manager from ChildSpring International for the graduation ceremony. After a couple of years teaching, she now is a self-confident young lady working as a translator and interpreter (speaking fluent Spanish, English, and French) for a multi-national business in Colombia.

The decades of 2000 through 2020 brought additional Outreach opportunities including yearly mission trips to Zambia led by Barbara Hughes, the monthly Communion Offering to collect donations for our ministry partners, and support of Stirred Up Ministries, Family Promise of North Fulton/DeKalb, the International Women's House, and the Sandy Springs Education Force/CAC Teacher's Closet. The challenges of the Covid pandemic inspired the congregation to donate \$100,000 in funding for our ministry partners to provide food and other necessities to their most vulnerable clients. Since 2002 Mount Vernon has provided dinner the 3rd Sunday of every month at Clifton Sanctuary Ministries, along with financial support and donations of clothing and other supplies. I am honored to serve as a member of the Board of Directors of the Clifton ministry and have seen first-hand the wonderful work being done among the most vulnerable of Atlanta's homeless - older men, veterans, and disabled.

PRESBYTERIAN ORDINATION

What did Shari learn at Seminary this month?

My Presbyterian History and Polity class has been studying the Book of Order, and we learned about a connection between the Book of Order and the Scots Confession. Dating back to 1560, The Scots Confession is one of the historic confessions from the Reformation. Section F-1.0303 of the Book of Order quotes the Scots Confession when it states that the true Church is present "wherever the Word of God is truly preached and heard, the Sacraments are rightly administered, and ecclesiastical discipline is uprightly ministered."

Here at Mount Vernon Presbyterian Church, we make visible these marks of the true Church through our life and work as a congregation. First, we read and listen to preaching on Scripture each week in our Sunday worship service. We believe that whenever the Word is read and proclaimed, Jesus Christ is present in the service through the power of the Holy Spirit. Secondly, we participate in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of every month and other significant Sundays in the church year. The Lord's Supper is the sign and seal of our communion with Christ.

Finally, we engage when needed in the administration of ecclesiastical discipline. While no one likes to dwell on the need for occasional discipline, we are thankful that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has an orderly process to follow. And discipline is a crucial aspect of our life as a congregation so that we can build up the body of Christ and achieve the great ends of the Church.

Through our commitment to these marks, preaching, the sacraments, and holding each other accountable through discipline, we reflect the presence of the body of Christ and the "true Church" in our community.




Taize





ISAAC'S MUSINGS...

What Did Isaac Think About (Too Much) This Month?

Time! Inspired by the book Becoming Friends of Time by John Swinton, I've wondered what time even is. Physicists tell us that time is bent and warped through space in such a way that time appears to speed up or slow down. Anthropologists tell us that different cultures experience the pace of time differently, some valuing a slower pace while others value a speedy pace. Movies play with all sorts of time-traveling themes and our own memories pull us backward in time and send us forward in time hundreds of moments each day.

The first clocks, as we know them with their twelve numbers around a dial, were invented by Medieval monks to insure that they made it to prayers on time. They wanted clocks to help them live in relationship with God. Soon after, the marketplace saw the value of accurate time keeping. Business-folks added a minute hand on the clock; eventually a second hand appeared as well. With the invention of the clock came the pressure to use one's time appropriately, since it was now visible to everyone just how much time was being spent on certain tasks.

John Swinton, in his book mentioned above, argues that this is not how God perceives time, and I think he has a wonderful point. God exists outside of time and has chosen to relate to us within time, through Jesus Christ. And Jesus Christ moved through the world at a certain speed, something like three miles-per-hour. That means that God, expressed in time, moves at three miles-per-hour. If God is love, then love moves in time at three mile-per-hour. God's time is slow, gentle, attentive, careful, giving, and soft.

I love this perspective, especially as ATL-Travelers with our pace and schedules. Time is not a pressure. Time is a gift from God, a way to relate to God, a way to live out God's purposes for us.



·Rev. Toney-Schmitt gave a report summarizing the results of the Vital Congregations Survey that congregants responded to in January. Survey responses from our congregation mirror the responses of other Presbyterian churches that are part of the VCI initiative.

•Preparations for the upcoming Agape Meal on Maundy Thursday were discussed, and the Session approved the use of wine as part of that meal.
