## † PRAYER OF CONFESSION

God of Justice, challenge us to be more and more like you.

We have developed science and technology so that we may be connected to anyone around the world, but we have failed to develop a true communion around the world.

We have developed an economic system that has given us the opportunity to make a living, but we have failed to make a life together. God never intended for a group of people to live in superfluous, inordinate wealth while others live in abject, deadening poverty.

We have developed a freedom of religion so that all may worship you in their way, but we have failed to unify the divisions within the Protestant church alone.

We continue to live and work in segregated spaces, failing to overcome the sins of racism and division that separate us from our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Forgive us, God of Justice, for decades of difficulty and missteps. Challenge us to be more like you, and fill us with the hope that comes from living by your example. . . . (silent confession) . . . Amen.

In 1958, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered a sermon to the northern **Presbyterian** Church where he challenged them on many of their current social justice issues. Those challenges will ring true in 2025; today's confession revisits these challenges laid out by Dr. King.

Dr. King's sermon in 1958 was inspired by Dr. Frederick Meek, who delivered his sermon to the congregants of Old South Church, Boston in February 1954.

#### RESPONSE

† AFFIRMATION OF FAITH (Confession of 1967, Inclusive Language Version, 9.46c)

The reconciliation of humankind through Jesus Christ makes it plain that enslaving poverty in a world of abundance is an intolerable violation of God's good creation. Because Jesus identified himself with the needy and exploited, the cause of the world's poor is the cause of his disciples. The church cannot condone poverty, whether it is the product of unjust social structures, exploitation of the defenseless, lack of national resources, absence of technological understanding, or rapid expansion of populations. The church calls all people to use their abilities, their possessions, and the fruits of technology as gifts entrusted to them by God for the maintenance of their families and the advancement of the common welfare. It encourages those forces in human society that raise hopes for better conditions and provide people with opportunity for a decent living. A church that is indifferent to poverty, or evades responsibility in economic affairs, or is open to one social class only, or expects gratitude for its beneficence makes a mockery of reconciliation and offers no acceptable worship to God.
